QUESTION BOX

What is the purpose of the prayer that takes place on the altar at the end of the service?

The so called "Last Gospel" is a recitation by the sacred Ministers after the Blessing at the Solemn Eucharist on Sundays. It is taken from the Gospel of John, chapter 1 vs. 1 to 14 (In the beginning was the Word) and was originally recited by the celebrant (as we still do). It is not a collective part of the liturgy, but rather designed to remind the sacred Ministers of the Holiness of the One, Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh. We note that at the point "and the Word was made flesh" the clergy genuflect, much in the same way as we all do in the Creed "and was incarnate".

AUGUST 6th THE TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD is an episode in the New Testament in which Jesus is transfigured (or metamorphosed) and becomes radiant in glory upon a mountain. The Synoptic Gospels (Matthew 17:1–9, Mark 9:2-8, Luke 9:28–36) describe it, and 2 Peter 1:16–18 refers to it.

In these accounts, Jesus and three of his apostles, Peter, James and John, go to a mountain (the Mount of Transfiguration). On the mountain, Jesus begins to shine with bright rays of light. Then the prophets Moses and Elijah appear next to him and he speaks with them. Jesus is then called "Son" by a voice in the sky, assumed to be God the Father, as in the Baptism of Jesus.

In Christian teachings, the Transfiguration is a pivotal moment, and the setting on the mountain is presented as the point where human nature meets God: the meeting place for the temporal and the eternal, with Jesus himself as the connecting point, acting as the bridge between heaven and earth.

The Transfiguration not only supports the identity of Jesus as the Son of God (as in his Baptism), but the statement "listen to him", identifies him as the messenger and mouth-piece of God. The significance of this identification is enhanced by the presence of Elijah and Moses, for it indicates to the apostles that Jesus is the voice of God "par excellence", and instead of Elijah or Moses, he should be listened to, surpassing the laws of Moses by virtue of his relationship with God as Son [2 Peter 1:16–18] echoes the same message: at the Transfiguration God assigns to Jesus a special "honor and glory" and it is the turning point at which God exalts Jesus above all other powers in creation, and positions him as ruler and judge. The Transfiguration also echoes the teaching by Jesus (as in Matthew 22:32) that God is not "the God of the dead, but of the living". Although Moses had died and Elijah had been taken up to heaven centuries before (as in 2 Kings 2:11), they now live in the presence of the Son of God, implying that the same return to life can apply to all who face death and have faith.

Cemetery Sunday at St. Peter's

When is Cemetery Sunday?

August 11 we will hold our usual 10:00 a.m. eucharist service in the cemetery.

Where is the St. Peter's Cemetery?

Out St. Peter's Road heading east, across the street from the Fair Isle Ford dealership and beside Sam's Restaurant. The service takes place well back down the lane. You'll barely see us from the street but we're back there.

Where can I park?

You can park along the road and walk down the cemetery lane. Or, if you have reduced mobility, you can have someone drop you off down back or park down at the back of the cemetery.

What is different about this service?

The service is essentially the same communion service as when we're in the church. The choir is there and will lead us in music. The celebrant, Fr. Peter Harris- rector emeritus, will read off the names of any parishioners who have died in the past year and we sing the beautiful Russian Contakion of the Departed. Other than that, it's the same lovely service but in a beautiful setting. Maybe a little more simplified with no organ.

What happens if it's inclement weather?

The service will be moved back to the church.

Do you need help setting up?

Good question. Feel free to ask either Father David or Michael Edward, sacristan, if they could use some help.

Is there anything special to consider?

If it's a sunny day you may want to wear a sun hat or shawl or put on sunscreen as it can be bright that time of day. Otherwise, just come and enjoy!

from The Crown of the Year by Austin Farrer, weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament. What is consecration? The Word of God seizes upon some grains of baked flour and some drops of wine, sets them apart from other physical things, and fixes them in a new and holy use. It happened when Jesus blessed bread and wine at the Last Supper: it has happened in every eucharist since. Something resembling it, though on the natural plane, happened when each of you was conceived in his mother's womb. Creative power seized suddenly upon a few elements among thousands, and fixed them in a new and vital being out of which you have come. The natural and the supernatural joined, when Christ was conceived in Mary by the Holy Ghost. The mystery is continued and extended in this holy sacrament. Bread and wine are made the body and blood of Christ; men, sluggish and blind as we, are seized by the creative Word, and confirmed in our heavenly being, as living parts of Christ.

AUGUST 5th OSWALD, KING AND MARTYR Oswald (c 604 – 5 August 642) was King of Northumbria from 634 until his death He was an Anglo Saxon, who came to rule after spending a period in exile in Ireland; after defeating the native British ruler, Oswald brought the two Northumbrian kingdoms of Bernicia and Deira once again under a single ruler, and promoted the spread of Christianity in Northumbria. Shortly after becoming king, he asked the Irish to send a bishop to facilitate the conversion of his people, and they sent Aidan, who offered a gentler approach to conversion. Oswald gave the island of Lindisfarne to Aidan as his episcopal see, and Aidan achieved great success in spreading the Christian faith; Bede mentions that Oswald acted as Aidan's interpreter when the latter was preaching, since Aidan did not know English well and Oswald had learned Irish during his exile. He is remembered not for renouncing his kingship or living austerely but faithfulness in his vocation as a Christian ruler.

AUGUST 7th THE NAME OF JESUS. This day calls us to remember the purpose of Christ's coming and its significance for us is found in his name Jesus, *Saviour*, the one come to save, heal and raise up, in knowledge and love.

AUGUST 10th LAURENCE, ARCHDEACON AND MARTYR (Latin: Laurentius, lit. "laurelled"; c. 225–258) was one of the seven deacons of ancient Rome under Pope Sixtus II that were martyred during the persecution of Emperor Valerian in 258.

A well-known legend has persisted from earliest times. As Archdeacon in Rome, St Lawrence was charged with the responsibility for the material goods of the Church and the distribution of alms to the poor. When the prefect of Rome demanded that St Lawrence turn over the riches of the Church, St Lawrence asked for three days to gather together the wealth. He worked swiftly to distribute as much Church property to the poor as possible, so as to prevent its being seized by the prefect. On the third day, at the head of a small delegation, he presented himself to the prefect, and when ordered to give up the treasures of the Church he presented the poor, the crippled, the blind and the suffering, and said these were the true treasures of the Church. One account records him declaring to the prefect, "The Church is truly rich, far richer than your emperor." The prefect was so angry that he had a great gridiron prepared, with coals beneath it, and had Lawrence's body placed on it (hence St Lawrence's association with the gridiron). After the martyr had suffered the pain for a long time, the legend concludes, he made his famous cheerful remark, "I'm well done. Turn me over!" From this derives his patronage of cooks and chefs.
