AUGUST 28th AUGUSTINE, BISHOP AND DOCTOR was an early Christian theologian and philosopher whose writings influenced the development of Western Christianity and Western philosophy. Among his most important works are *City of God* and *Confessions*. According to his contemporary, Jerome, Augustine "established anew the ancient Faith". Believing that the grace of Christ was essential to human freedom, e.g he helped formulate the doctrine of original sin, the belief that humans, on their own tend to commit sinful acts and need God's love and the grace of Resurrection

When the Western Roman Empire began to disintegrate, Augustine developed the concept of the Church as a spiritual City of God, distinct from the material Earthly City.

Question Box Response

Please explain when these started and what they mean today: Heretics, Agnostics, Apostasy, and Gnosticism.

There have always been differences of opinion within the Church. Many of Paul's Epistles are devoted to sorting out various issues among Christians. Sometimes, however, differences of opinion are so serious that they endanger the authenticity and unity of the Church itself.

A "heresy" is an idea which is so contrary to the accepted teachings that it divides the Church, even though the "heretics" may claim to be true Christians themselves. The term "heresy" has been applied to many unorthodox versions of Christianity from the Second Century up to modern times. At times Roman Catholics and Protestants have regarded each other as heretics. Although "heretics" may still regard themselves as Christians even when they separate from the existing Church, "apostasy" means that someone completely rejects the religion they belong to, and either converts to another one, or becomes entirely non-religious. If a Christian becomes a Muslim or a Muslim becomes a Christian, they could each be regarded as "apostates" from their first religion.

"Gnosticism" usually refers to several ancient "heretical" versions of Christianity. The word "gnosticism" comes from the Greek word for "knowledge." In general, Gnostic movements taught that salvation was not about sin and redemption, but rather about secret divine wisdom which would release us from ignorance and suffering. Gnostic Christians taught that Christ appeared in the world to reveal this unseen spiritual Truth, and they sometimes denied that he had a physical body at all. The original Gnostic movements died out long ago, but their ideas appeal to some people in modern times, so the term is still being used. While "Gnosticism" is about gaining spiritual knowledge, "agnosticism" is the contrary view that we cannot possibly know about anything beyond this world, such as whether or not God exists, or whether or not there is life after death. "Agnostics" say that there is not enough solid information to hold any particular opinion on these issues, one way or the other. On the other hand, "atheists" hold the definite view that no God or gods exist.
