Question Box:

Question: Please explain the purpose and use of incense in the service. Answer, part 1/2:

"For from the rising of the sun even unto the going down of the same my name shall be great among the Gentiles; and in every place incense shall be offered unto my name, and a pure offering: for my name shall be great among the heathen, saith the Lord of hosts" (Malachi 1. 11).

Incense has been a part of worship in many cultures for thousands of years as a means of sacrifice, purification, and veneration. In Jewish tradition, the use of incense is set out in the Old Testament, particularly in the book of Exodus. Frankincense was among the gifts brought by the magi to the Christ child (Matt. 2. 11). In the book of Revelation, incense is associated with prayer (Rev. 5. 8; Rev. 8. 3).

Sunday Service is our greatest act of worship. Our Sunday High Mass uses all of our human faculties to show our love and adoration to God; nothing is too much to glorify God. In the Anglican Church, the use of incense is chiefly at Mass—offered at the Introit, the proclamation of the Gospel, the offertory, and the prayer of Consecration. All of our human senses are to be used. Incense allows us to use the sense of smell, adding to the beauty and mystery of our worship and helping us to direct our minds to the unseen in a way beyond words alone. Incense symbolizes three aspects of our worship. It signifies the presence of God, setting apart or consecrating objects or people in the context of worship; it is a symbol of prayer, the rising smoke signifying our prayers rising up to God; and it is a sign of oblation or offering.

A light lunch will be served following the 10:30 service as we share a special time of fellowship and refreshments.



from The Crown of the Year by Austin Farrer, weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament. Christ gives himself to you under the signs of bread and wine. The food is assimilated, it loses its own nature and takes on yours. So with the life of Christ bestowed on you: it takes on the forms of your life and action, not (at first sight) the forms of Christ's. Men nourished on the life of Christ are more fully themselves for the gift; their personal quality is stronger, freer, more characteristic. Christ's self-giving is self-effacing, he does not impose himself, he studies his disciples. But with what effect? Not that he is moulded to them, but that they are moulded to him. The strongest influence is exercised by the man who gives himself entirely away and does not think of himself. So it is with the love of God. He becomes as we, that he may make us as himself.
