QUESTION BOX RESPONSE:

Why do we use Incense at worship? Part 2/2

People, places, and objects are censed during the service to consecrate them—to set them apart and make them ready for the presence of God. The Altar and cross are censed at the very beginning of the service. The priest is censed to lead the congregation before God and to serve as God's instrument during the service. Likewise, the other sacred ministers and servers are censed to set them apart for their holy tasks. The Gospel book is censed because it is the very Word through which God speaks to us. Our offering is censed because it is an offering to God. The bread and wine are censed during the Eucharistic prayer and at the moment of consecration to be set apart as the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ—God becomes truly present there. And the people are censed as we ready ourselves to commune with Jesus Christ's presence through and in the Eucharist.

When censing a particular person or object, the number of swings of the thurible varies. The following is the practice at St. Peter's:

- Three doubles for the Celebrant; the altar cross, and the elevation of the consecration bread and wine.
- Two doubles for the Deacon of the Mass.
- One double for the Subdeacon.
- Three singles—centre, left, right—for groups of servers, the choir, and congregation.


At Mass, incense is blessed before use. The Celebrant places the incense on the charcoal in the thurible and each time he offers a blessing: "Be thou blessed of Him in Whose honour thou art to be burned," and makes the sign of the cross.

The thurifer is the server who bears and swings the "censer", which is the thurible. The thurible is brought into the church only long enough for its use, and is otherwise placed in the Sacristy.

"And another angel came and stood at the altar, having a golden censer; and there was given unto him much incense, that he should offer it with the prayers of all saints upon the golden altar which was before the throne" (Rev. 8:3).

from The Crown of the Year by Austin Farrer, weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament. Christ taught us to pray for daily bread in saying the Pater Noster, and added some comments to the prayer. He taught that for the very reason that God is our Father and we his family, it is fitting that we should seek our bread from his hand. We say the Pater Noster in this sacrament, remembering how Christ went from the Last Supper straight to Gethsemane, and prayed to his Father there in the spirit of a true Son. Abba, Father, he said, asking for the wholesome bread of life if he could have it, but willing to receive the bitter cup of death and shame if it was his Father's will. St. Paul says that it is the Spirit of Sonship, overflowing from Christ to us, which speaks in our hearts when we say Our Father. We kneel with Christ in Gethsemane to say that prayer, and even then it is not truly said unless Christ says it in us through the Holy Ghost.

BENEDICTION

According to Article XXV OF THE SACRAMENTS, of the 39 Articles of Religion, Book of Common Prayer page 708, "The Sacraments were not ordained of Christ to be gazed upon, or to be carried about, but that we should duly use them."

Much of our worship e.g. the order, the prayers, the use of hymns, the vestments, architecture, is not specifically "ordained of Christ" but nonetheless serves the purpose of conveying Christ to the believer

The church father Cyril, Bishop of Jerusalem, 350-386 A.D. describes the manner of receiving the sacrament, to the newly baptized, using all of the senses, "In approaching therefore, come not with thy wrists extended, or thy fingers spread; but make thy left hand a throne for the right, as for that which is to receive a King. And having hollowed thy palm, receive the Body of Christ, saying over it, Amen. *So then after having carefully hallowed thine eyes by the touch of the Holy Body*, partake of it; giving heed lest thou lose any portion thereof."

Devotions surrounding the blessed sacrament, at times out side of the celebration of Holy Communion, e.g. at Evensong, do not replace the proper use of the sacrament, but provide a moment of meditation, touching the eyes and the heart of the believer with the blessing of Christ, whose presence is signified in the holy mysteries of the Eucharist.
