OCTOBER 9th ROBERT GROSSETESTE *literally Robert Great Head*

c. 1168-70 – 8 or 9 October 1253) was born at Stradbroke in Suffolk, studied in the University of Paris – and in 1224 became the Chancellor of Oxford University where he befriended and taught the newly founded orders of Friars, those who followed Francis of Assisi in poverty and humility: In 1229 he became Archdeacon of Leicester and a Canon of and then Bishop of Lincoln. He was a man of learning and an inspiration to scholars, a wise administrator whilst a true shepherd of his flock, ever concerned to lead them to Christ in whose service he strove to temper justice with mercy, hating the sin while loving the sinner, not sparing the rod though cherishing the weak – He died on 8 October 1253.

OCTOBER 10th PAULINUS, Missionary and Archbishop

d. 10 October 644 was a member of the mission sent in 601 by Pope Gregory I to Christianize the Anglo-Saxons. After some years spent in Kent, 625, Paulinus was consecrated a bishop. He accompanied Æthelburg of Kent, sister of King Eadbald of Kent, on her journey to Northumbria to marry King Edwin of Northumbria, and eventually succeeded in converting Edwin to Christianity. Paulinus also converted many of Edwin's subjects and built some churches.

Question Box Response:

Question: What do the seven hanging lamps at the altar represent?

Answer: The seven lamps that hang above the communion rail were placed in the Cathedral in 1873, and are the first lights added to the Cathedral. (The altar candles arrived four years later.) The seven lamps represent the seven virtues: Humility, Charity, Chastity, Gratitude, Temperance, Patience, and Diligence.

from **The Crown of the Year** *by Austin Farrer, weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament.* St Matthew's story of the paralytic abbreviates St Mark's account. St Mark's fuller story reads like a burial-scene. The paralytic is helpless as the dead, he is carried out like the dead by his four bearers; a hole is opened for him, as for the dead, and he is lowered into it, as into his grave. But, falling, he does not fall into clay, he falls before the feet of the Son of God, who says to him first 'Thy sins are forgiven thee' and then 'Arise and walk'. Jesus is by his own death the forgiveness of our sins; he is the resurrection and the life through his own resurrection. We are thrown into the life-giving sepulchre of Christ, we touch the slain and living Christ, his body and his blood; our sins are forgiven us, and we live by him; we arise to walk in all those good works that he has prepared for us to walk in.
