Free Popcorn and Lemonade Provided! **OCTOBER 25th CRISPIN and CRISPINIAN,** Martyrs who tradition says were born to a noble Roman family in the 3rd century AD, Crispin and Crispinian fled persecution for their faith, ending up at Soissons, France, where they preached Christianity to the Gauls while making shoes by night. It is stated that they were twin brothers

They earned enough by their trade to support themselves and also to aid the poor. Their success attracted the ire of Rictus Varus, governor of Belgic Gaul, who had them tortured and thrown into the river with millstones around their necks. Though they survived, they were beheaded by the emperor c. 286.

The St Crispin's Day speech is a part of William Shakespeare's history play Henry V. On the eve of the Battle of Agincourt, which fell on Saint Crispin's Day, Henry V urges his men, who were vastly outnumbered by the French, to imagine the glory that will be theirs if they are victorious. "Crispin Crispian shall ne'er go by, From this day to the ending of the world, But we in it shall be remembered—We few, we happy few, we band of brothers; For he to-day that sheds his blood with me, Shall be my brother".

The St. Peter's Annual REQUIEM EUCHARIST will be offered on ALL SOULS DAY, Saturday, November 2nd at 7 pm

At the Requiem, which parallels the form of an ordinary funeral in many ways, we intercede on behalf of our departed loved ones. So, for example, instead of praying *"have mercy upon us"* in the Agnus Dei (O Lamb of God) we say instead, **"grant them rest"** and *"grant them rest eternal"*.

One of the "proper prefaces" that we use before the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy), at Easter and memorial services, describes the marvelous work of God in Christ, that comes about by his death and resurrection : "BUT chiefly are we bound to praise thee for the glorious Resurrection of thy Son Jesus Christ our Lord: for he is the very Paschal Lamb, which was offered for us, and hath taken away the sin of the world; who by his death hath destroyed death, and by his rising to life again hath restored to us everlasting life."

Another preface that we sometimes use, especially at All Souls, describes the promise of *"immortality to come"* and assures us that to the Lord's *"Faithful people" "life is changed not taken away.": "In whom hath shone forth unto us the hope of a blessèd resurrection, that they who bewail the certain condition of their mortality may be consoled by the promise of immortality to come. For to thy faithful people, O Lord, life is changed not taken away: and at the dissolution of the tabernacle of this earthly sojourning a dwelling place eternal is made ready in the heavens".*

The Eucharist finishes with a prayer that the "Angels lead us into Paradise" and, reminds us of our duty here on earth when it refers to the parable of our Lord about the rich man and the poor man Lazarus, who in his humility, found eternal rest in "Abraham's bosom" while the rich man, who did not care about others, did not, we pray that, "like Lazarus, once a beggar, may they have eternal rest". All Souls Day, or the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, follows a rich historical practice. In the early church, Christians, in Rome, were persecuted and had to take refuge in the underground caves called catacombs. Here they buried their beloved and departed, some of whom were leaders in the faith. Being close to their mortal remains provided comfort, because these people believed in Jesus' Resurrection, and the promise that like Him, they would rise too. They believed that these departed folk were with the Lord, truly alive, and just as one might pray to Christ, so one might ask those departed folk to intercede to Christ, in whose presence they were. We never cease to love them, nor do they stop loving us. When we pray, we pray with them, **"Our Father."** Note that this never implied that one prayed to them in the same way one prayed to God. We pray that they might pray for us as we might ask any good friend or neighbour.

We ask God to continually love all who have gone before, even as we realistically acknowledge their faults and ours. But know that the God we love and worship has another name, and that is Love. And in the person of Jesus Christ, God loved us so much that he was willing to die for us, to experience the deepest pain and loss, so that we might know the depth of his compassionate sacrificial love. He is a friend who invites us to live eternally in His Presence. So when we pray Sunday by Sunday *"therefore with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven"*, we declare that we believe our departed brothers and sisters, and we ourselves, are always and truly in God's presence through his mercy and grace

Our remembrance of the departed, on November 2nd, reminds us that death is not our end but the beginning of another greater adventure in life. While, like Christ encountering another Lazarus, his departed friend, he was so moved that he wept, we are deeply moved by our mortality, in this poignant service we know loss and we grieve but at the same time that, even in this grief, we encounter, in the Risen Christ, the truer life of Resurrection.

It is whatever Christ is, and Christ is everything to Christian men. In particular, he is the supreme bond between us. Everyone of you communicating is bound to his neighbour by this, that the Christ who lives in one, lives in the other. You care for your fellow Christian as you would care for Christ, and that in you which does the caring is also Christ. Christ in each cares for Christ in all when we communicate together. The same bond unites us with the saints in paradise, who make up by far the greater part of Christ's people, and with our departed friends who may not yet be in paradise, but for whom we care, and for whom we pray.
