In this Octave of All Saints, we give thanks for all the saints of God in every age; this week we remember especially St Willibrord; and also the Founders, Benefactors, and Missionaries of the Church in Canada.

PARISH QUESTION BOX: The parish's question box is in the back of the Cathedral: You are invited to ask any question you might have about St. Peter's or our faith, with responses printed each week in the bulletin.

Question Box Response:

Why do we bow or genuflect in church?

"And when they were come into the house, they saw the young child with Mary his mother, and fell down, and worshipped him..." St. Matthew 2:11

"And as they went to tell His disciples, behold, Jesus met them, saying, "Rejoice!" So they came and held Him by the feet and worshiped Him." St. Matthew 28:9

When we come to worship, we involve all our senses and our entire human body. Bowing and genuflection allow us to use our "body language" to express our recognition of God's presence, our gratitude for God's sacrifice, and our devotion to God. Anglicans tend to bow in a gesture of reverence and respect to the altar, even when crossing in front of the altar outside of religious services. The altar is central because it is a symbol of Christ and His offering of Himself as a sacrifice on our behalf. The altar is where Christ's holy sacrifice is made present in the Sacrament. Further to this, the sacred ministers (and all may) bow three times during the Gloria, at the words: "We worship thee" (in adoration), at the Name of Jesus (in reverence to the Holy Name), and "Receive our prayer" (in petition).

Similarly, a genuflection is a bending of the right knee to the ground. We genuflect, as we are able, in reverence of Christ's Incarnation. Therefore, we genuflect when the Blessed Sacrament is present. Christ becomes present in our midst when the bread and wine are blessed and made holy to become Christ's body and blood in the Eucharist. Recalling this, we genuflect as we approach the altar to receive communion, and we always genuflect in All Souls' Chapel, where the reserved Blessed Sacrament is kept. We also may genuflect at the creed's reference to the Incarnation: "And was incarnate by the Holy Ghost..." We also see the sacred ministers and altar servers genuflect at the end of the service during the recitation of the Last Gospel when "and the Word was made flesh" (John 1:14) is read.

from The Crown of the Year by Austin Farrer, weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament. 'Our conversation'—better translate, 'Our life, our social existence'—' is in heaven', and therefore St Paul is deeply indignant against those who would make their religion a matter of mere earthly observances. Our life is part of heaven, we that are Christians; it is so all the time, whether we know it or not. But in this sacramental mystery at least we know that we are part of heaven, for we lift up our hearts and become present with Christ the Lord. For half an hour we are to enjoy the converse, the social existence, of heaven. Let us not, then, sleep through this sacrament, but exercise our souls in heavenly converse. Some are well supplied with prayers that rise from within, but it is always right and good to follow due prayers of the whole service, not reading them merely, but saying them silently with the priest. For we are all priests, and the offering belongs to us all. If we do this with the best will we have at due time, mindful of our friends' need as well as our own, we shall never have misused the sacrament; and as we can always do this, we need not hesitate to communicate often.
