# JUNE 29th PETER AND PAUL THE APOSTLES

Friend and disciple of Jesus, Peter was a fisherman from Galilee. He was the first to call Jesus "Messiah." Immediately following the crucifixion of Jesus, he left Jerusalem, but returned and met the Risen Lord. He was present at the revelation of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and according to tradition, he traveled to Rome and served as the first Bishop of Rome.

Paul was born in the Roman Colony of Tarsus and so was a Roman citizen. He was also a devout Jew, and was among those who persecuted the early followers of Jesus for breaking Jewish law. A dramatic revelation convinced him of the truth of Jesus' divinity, though it did not require him to deny Judaism in any way. Paul then spent the rest of his life spreading the new faith, and his letters to the various congregations around the Eastern Mediterranean are the only contemporary records from the movement.

The Church's tradition teaches that Peter and Paul both died as martyrs in Rome during the persecution under Nero in 64 A.D. According to tradition, Paul was granted the right of a Roman citizen to be beheaded by a sword, but Peter suffered the fate of his Lord, crucifixion, though with head downward. They each have separate commemorations as well: Peter on January 18, for his confession of Jesus as the Messiah, and Paul on January 25, for his conversion.

As we celebrate Canada Day: Two Fathers of Confederation were members of St. Peter's – *Hon. George Coles* and *Hon. Thomas Heath Haviland. George Coles* served as the first Premier of Prince Edward Island. Both are interred in St. Peter's cemetery.

*Mercy Coles*, a daughter of George Coles, attended the Charlottetown and Quebec Conferences as well as the Confederation promotion tour. Her diary is one of the most detailed sources about the events leading to Confederation, including her reflections on the personalities of the Fathers of Confederation.

*Robert Harris*, famous for painting the Fathers of Confederation, attended St. Peter's School, was active in the parish and 18 of his paintings adorn All Souls' Chapel.

The minister at the altar still uses the ancient attitude of prayer; he holds out the palms of his hands, like a child waiting for you to throw him a ball, or like a man going out to feel the falling rain after a great drought. The bread of God falls like the manna from heaven; bring out your baskets, hold out your arms. God will fill your empty vessels if you will uncover them. You who come to this sacrament, what are your wants? Open the gulf of your desire, that God may fill it. Who desires holiness, who desires to care more for others than for himself, who hungers and thirsts for the Spirit of Jesus Christ? Ask, he says, and you shall receive, but ask.
