## **Question Box Response**

Could you please explain the difference between: Catholic Church, Roman Catholic Church, Apostolic Church, Anglican Church, Protestant Church?

**"Apostolic"** generally indicates that a Church today remains faithful to the teaching and practice of the Apostles, those disciples who knew and heard Jesus in person. More specifically, it can be used to say that a particular denomination follows the Apostolic order, meaning that it is led by the three ordained offices of Bishop, Priest, and Deacon. Bishops are considered to be successors to the Apostles.

"Catholic" literally means "universal." This is its meaning in the Creeds: it applies across the board to all churches which teach the basic, universal truths of the faith. Some people also use it as shorthand for "Roman Catholic." The Roman Catholic Church is governed on earth by the Bishop of Rome, the Pope.

Similarly, the term **"Orthodox"** applies to any church which teaches the truths of the faith correctly. But it can also be used to distinguish the Eastern Churches, which do not accept the Pope as supreme authority, from the Roman Catholics who do. These Orthodox Churches often have distinct national or cultural expressions, such as the Greek Orthodox or Ukrainian Orthodox, Antiochian Orthodox, Malankara Orthodox churches.

**Anglican** churches are those which are rooted in the Church of England. Similarly to the Eastern Orthodox churches, Anglican churches follow the Apostolic order of Bishops, Priests, and Deacons but do not accept the supremacy of the Pope.

**Protestant** churches are rooted in the Reformation which took place in Western Europe in the 1500s. They have tended to reject many aspects of the Roman Catholic, Orthodox, and Anglican traditions by focusing more narrowly on the Bible as they interpret it. For example, most Protestant churches do not have the threefold ministry of Bishops, Priests, and Deacons because they don't believe that this is how the church was organized in New Testament times. Some of the major Protestant traditions include Lutherans, Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptists, Pentecostals, and the United Church of Canada.

*from* **The Crown of the Year** *by Austin Farrer,* **weekly paragraphs on the Holy Sacrament**. I shall presently invite you to make confession, and shall be praying for your absolution. The washing of the disciples' feet at the Last Supper according to St. John's Gospel fitly expresses the absolving power of the eucharist. Baptism, St. John conveys to us, is the bath by which the Christian people has put off uncleanness once for all; Holy Communion is a foot-washing by which the dust of daily sin is daily washed away. Jesus said to Peter at the supper: 'Unless I wash thee, thou hast no part with me.' The Son of God knelt before Peter to wash his feet; the Son of God had humbled himself to be a man, and was presently to die for our cleansing on the altar of the cross. You will gratefully and firmly believe that you have full cleansing in this sacrament, from your laziness and irreligion as well as from more positive offences. Go out carrying your cleanness before God, and when you fail, your remedy is always here.
