Cemetery Sunday at St. Peter's

When is Cemetery Sunday?

August 11 we will hold our usual 10:00 a.m. eucharist service in the cemetery.

Where is the St. Peter's Cemetery?

Out St. Peter's Road heading east, across the street from the Fair Isle Ford dealership and beside Sam's Restaurant. The service takes place well back down the lane. You'll barely see us from the street but we're back there.

Where can I park?

You can park along the road and walk down the cemetery lane. Or, if you have reduced mobility, you can have someone drop you off down back or park down at the back of the cemetery.

What is different about this service?

The service is essentially the same communion service as when we're in the church. The choir is there and will lead us in music. The celebrant, Fr. Peter Harris- rector emeritus, will read off the names of any parishioners who have died in the past year and we sing the beautiful Russian Contakion of the Departed. Other than that, it's the same lovely service but in a beautiful setting. Maybe a little more simplified with no organ.

What happens if it's inclement weather?

The service will be moved back to the church.

Do you need help setting up?

Good question. Feel free to ask either Father David or Michael Edward, sacristan, if they could use some help.

Is there anything special to consider?

If it's a sunny day you may want to wear a sun hat or shawl or put on sunscreen as it can be bright that time of day. Otherwise, just come and enjoy!

QUESTION BOX

Why is there a Celebrant, Deacon, and Subdeacon at every Sung Eucharist on Sundays when one clergy is sufficient for other services?

The forms for celebrating the Eucharist, Holy Communion, The Lord's Supper, or Mass have evolved in the Christian church over the past 2000 years. By the 12th century, the "regular" form of the Eucharist in the Church of England had become what was called High Mass. To quote one of our sources: "Solemn or High Mass is the full form of Mass, and elements of the abbreviated forms can be explained only in its light. It is the norm; it is only in the complete rite with deacon and subdeacon that the ceremonies can be understood. Low Mass, said by a priest alone with one server, is a shortened and simplified form of the same thing and its ritual can be ultimately explained only by a reference to High Mass."

We can only speculate on how the inclusion of the roles of celebrant, deacon, and subdeacon came about. But the impression created for the participant at the Eucharist by the three similarly vested clergy, and often a lay person as subdeacon, supporting, assisting, moving about in unity of function with each other, is surely a powerful "Trinitarian" image, one that visually 'calls to mind' the three Persons of the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, whom we acknowledge when we recite the Nicene Creed.

Here at St. Peter's, it has been part of our mandate since our establishment to uphold the origins and traditional practices of our faith that are too quickly disappearing in our church; and so we value the opportunity to experience a form of our worship that is foundational to it. The first records of worship here describe "High Celebrations" when Priest Deacon and Subdeacon, with appropriate vestments, were present for the Sung Eucharist on Sundays and other feast days.

It has been ten years or so since this has been possible, but we currently enjoy the opportunity to offer regular Sunday High Mass thanks to the arrival and presence within our parish family of Father Stephen Petrie, who can fill the 'canonical' role of Deacon or Celebrant, along with the Rector as well as a lay person acting as subdeacon. A said Eucharist, or Low Mass is celebrated by the Rector, every Sunday at 8.00 a.m. and each weekday, in the Chapel.

JULY 29th OLAF, KING AND MARTYR also called Olaf Haraldsson. The son of King Harald Grenske of Norway, he spent most of his youth as a Norse raider until 1010 when he was baptized at Rouen. In 1013, he journeyed to England and offered his services to King Ethelred against the invading Danes. Returning home in 1015 after succeeding to the throne, he embarked upon a war to free Norway from the domination of the Danes and the Swedes, defeating Earl Sweyn at Nesje in 1016. He also immediately requested that missionaries be sent from England to advance the Christianization of Norway. Owing to the harsh nature of his rule, he faced a rebellion of nobles in 1029. Through the aid of the formidable King Canute of Denmark, the rebels overthrew him and drove him into exile in Russia. Olaf returned in 1031 but was slain in battle at Stiklestad, Norway, on July 29. While neither popular nor considered especially holy during his lifetime, Olaf was soon revered after death owing to reports of miracles occurring at his tomb. He was greatly respected as a champion of Norwegian independence, and his shrine became the foundation of the cathedral of Trondheim, which was a popular place of pilgrimage during the Middle Ages. He is the patron of Norway, and was canonized in 1164.

JULY 29th WILLIAM WILBERFORCE (24 August 1759 – 29 July 1833) was a conservative member of the Evangelical branch of the Church of England, an English politician, philanthropist, and a leader of the movement to abolish the slave trade.

In 1787, he came into contact with Thomas Clarkson and a group of antislave-trade activists, including Granville Sharp, Hannah More and Charles Middleton. They persuaded Wilberforce to take on the cause of abolition, and he soon became one of the leading English abolitionists. He headed the parliamentary campaign against the British slave trade for twenty years until the passage of the Slave Trade Act of 1807.

Wilberforce was convinced of the importance of religion, morality and education. He championed causes and campaigns such as the Society for the Suppression of Vice, British missionary work in India, the creation of a free colony in Sierra Leone, the foundation of the Church Mission Society, and the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. His underlying conservatism led him to support politically and socially controversial legislation, and resulted in criticism that he was ignoring injustices at home while campaigning for the enslaved abroad.

In later years, Wilberforce supported the campaign for the complete abolition of slavery, and continued his involvement after 1826, when he resigned from Parliament because of his failing health. That campaign led to the Slavery Abolition Act 1833, which abolished slavery in most of the British Empire; Wilberforce died just three days after hearing that the passage of the Act through Parliament was assured. He was buried in Westminster Abbey, close to his friend Prime Minister, William Pitt.

When we exchange between us the words of the sursum corda, the lifting of our hearts to the Lord will be more than a pious aspiration, it will be a divine fact. The sacrament is the presence of Jesus Christ, and Jesus Christ is in heaven. He stoops to us in this Sacrament, as he does through his whole incarnation; but he stoops to lift us to himself. In a true mystery, not in edifying fancy, we are with him in that divine place. There is the whole Church of God; there are the saints who pray for us in their glory, and there by the power of hope are the souls, for whom we pray that they may speedily be joined with the saints. The saints, the souls departed and the Church on earth in every place are one life and one prayer through Christ their high priest. The effort, in mutual communion, of each spirit living or departed is requisite for the perfection of the Body of Christ. All are the support of each, and the whole hangs upon heaven in a point which is the Lord Jesus.
