PARISH QUESTION BOX: The parish's question box is in the back of the Cathedral: You are invited to ask any question you might have about St. Peter's or our faith, with responses printed in the bulletin.

Question Box Response:

Why do we have "riddel" curtains on either side of the altar?

Riddel posts or riddel screens are ornamental posts, often made of fabric, which serve both a symbolic and a practical use. In medieval times the altar was often "screened off" from the congregation, emphasizing the sacredness and separation between the divine and the human, the clergy and the laity. Today the fabric screens can help to focus the attention of the congregation on the altar, and act as a physical reminder of the sacred space of the altar and the holiness of the sacrament. The use of riddel screens also identifies a church sanctuary as "English use" in decoration and ornamentation, conforming to the Prayer Book Ornaments Rubric (p. lvi) of the BCP which states that chancels and vestments should be as they were in the second year of the reign of Edward the Sixth.

We are, says the collect, not we shall be, punished for our offences: the world by boredom and fear of war, the Church by impotence and self-reproach, and we by separation from the life of God. Punished, says the collect, and justly punished; for if we are separated from God, is it not that we have cut ourselves off, by laziness in praying, and faithlessness in obeying? But, says the collect, we may yet pray with confidence to be relieved of punishment by God's mercy through Jesus Christ. Our punishment lasts no longer than our will to live without God. We throw ourselves into Christ's sacrifice, we are offered, presented by him to God along with his own flesh and blood; for we are his flesh and blood, he does not disown us.
